Palm Sunday: The Triumphal Entry Matthew 21:1–11

Context

"Many of the Jews therefore, who had come with Mary and had seen what he did, believed in him, but some of them went to the Pharisees and told them what Jesus had done. So the chief priests and the Pharisees gathered the council and said, 'What are we to do? For this man performs many signs. If we let him go on like this, everyone will believe in him, and the Romans will come and take away both our place and our nation.' But one of them, Caiaphas, who was high priest that year, said to them, 'You know nothing at all. Nor do you understand that it is better for you that one man should die for the people, not that the whole nation should perish.' He did not say this of his own accord, but being high priest that year he prophesied that Jesus would die for the nation, and not for the nation only, but also to gather into one the children of God who are scattered abroad. So from that day on they made plans to put him to death." (John 11:45–53)

The Triumphal Entry

"Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion! Shout aloud, O daughter of Jerusalem! Behold, your king is coming to you; righteous and having salvation is he, humble and mounted on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey." (Zechariah 9:9)

Lesson #1: We learn who Jesus is.

"For all the promises of God find their Yes in him." (2 Corinthians 1:20)

Lesson #2: We learn how to respond to Jesus.

"If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake and the gospel's will save it." (Mark 8:34–35)

Lesson #3: We learn why to repent.

"Now at the feast the governor was accustomed to release for the crowd any one prisoner whom they wanted. And they had then a notorious prisoner called Barabbas. So when they had gathered, Pilate said to them, 'Whom do you want me to release for you: Barabbas, or Jesus who is called Christ?' For he knew that it was out of envy that they had delivered him up. Besides, while he was sitting on the judgment seat, his wife sent word to him, 'Have nothing to do with that righteous man, for I have suffered much because of him today in a dream.' Now the chief priests and the elders persuaded the crowd to ask for Barabbas and destroy Jesus. The governor again said to them, 'Which of the two do you want me to release for you?' And they said, 'Barabbas.' Pilate said to them, 'Then what shall I do with Jesus who is called Christ?' They all said, 'Let him be crucified!'" (Matthew 27:15–23)

Lesson #4: We learn what Jesus was prepared to do.

"For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life that I may take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have authority to lay it down, and I have authority to take it up again. This charge I have received from my Father." (John 10:17–18)

Discuss

- If Jesus is Messiah (Christ), what does that mean for you, and what does it mean for the people in your life?
- When we live for the praise of people (instead of the praise of God), what are some of the consequences in our lives?
- What are some of the ways that you see yourself in the crowds that praised Jesus on Sunday but rejected him on Friday?

Read

Exodus 12:1-51; Psalm 118:1-29; Matthew 21:12-17

Pray

- Pray that God will help you to worship and trust Jesus as the Messiah.
- Pray that God will help you to humble yourself before him in repentance as you reflect on your need for Jesus.
- Pray that God will give you a deeper appreciation for the love that Jesus displayed for his Father and for his people in entering Jerusalem.
