## Faith is trusting in Jesus words – even when they are mysterious and hard (Jn 6.41-71; 03-21-21am)

For context and understanding of Jesus' hard saying:

- 1. Jesus was Master Communicator frequently used stories (parables) & word-pictures (bread of life)
- 2. Statements should not be taken literally using physical illustrations to teach about spiritual realities
  - a. There is a totality of commitment called for when one comes to Christ
  - b. There is an implied reference to Jesus' death on the cross in His language of flesh and blood
  - c. There is also a reasonable hint about Lord's Supper in words about eating and drinking

## Central thought:

Saving faith will not understand everything about Jesus, but it will understand that Jesus is the way to God.

- I. The scandalous sayings of Jesus reinforce the supremacy of God & the mystery of salvation (41-59)
- A. God works; man believes (44-47)
- B. Jesus brings life & Jesus is life (48ff)
- C. God gives life; man receives life (56-57)

## II. Hard sayings of Jesus separate true followers from self-centered followers (60-71)

A. Hard sayings clarify what real faith involves (60-65)

## Implications:

- 1. If we are offended because Jesus sets the rules for genuine faith, we risk rejecting Jesus (60-62)
- 2. No one is able to acquire eternal life on his/her own God is the giver of eternal life (63)
- 3. All followers are not true believers (64-65)
- B. Hard sayings separate true believers from hangers-on (66-71)

  True believers . . .
  - 1. Trust Jesus' words even when they are mysterious and hard to comprehend (66-67)
  - 2. Will not walk away when Jesus' teaching are hard to understand or hard to apply (cf. 1 Jn 2.19)
  - 3. Recognize Jesus is the only way to God (68-69)
  - 4. Come to understand that their salvation is a gift from God

Two applications:

- 1. Don't limit your faith to what you can figure out by your logic much of the gospel is mystery 2. If you desire to genuinely follow Jesus, you must be prepared to accept hard truths on faith
